Tisha B'Av 5775 July 26, 2015

Many Jewish Americans observe Tisha B'Av, which is the ninth day of the month of Av in the Jewish calendar. It is a day of mourning to remember various events such as the destruction of the First Temple and Second Temple in Jerusalem.



Tisha B'Av is a sad day that observes other major disasters and tragedies that Jewish people experienced throughout history, including the expulsion of the Jewish people from England in 1290 and from Spain in 1492, as well as the mass deportation of Jewish people from the Warsaw Ghetto during World War II.

Tisha B'Av begins at sunset on the previous day and lasts for more than 24 hours. It is the culmination of a three-week period of mourning. Weddings and other parties are generally not permitted and people refrain from cutting their hair during this period. It is customary to refrain from activities such as eating meat or drinking wine (except on the Shabbat) from the first to the ninth day of Av.

The Book of Lamentations is read and mourning prayers are recited in the synagogue. The Ark (cabinet where the Torah is kept) is draped in black.

Rabbi's Message July 2015

"Lessons for Leadership"

Recently we celebrated the installation of the officers of this congregation. The Torah can provide lessons on

leadership. Consider the circumstances of the Israelite people. They have wandered their way through the

wilderness to the edge of the Promised Land. However, before they enter, Moses wishes to check out the land by sending a group of scouts as instructed by God.

"The Lord spoke to Moses, saying, "Send men to scout the land of Canaan, which I am giving to the Israelite

people; send one man from each of the ancestral tribes, each one a chieftain among them." The Torah then names each one of these scouts. But one thing is clear – these scouts are not just scouts; they constitute the leadership of the Israelite people.

So what happens? Moses sends them out with a list of searching questions about the state of this land that they are to inhabit. What are the questions? They are sensible ones that the people need to know to assess the accessibility of this new land. "See what kind of country it is. Are the people who dwell in it strong or weak, few or many? Is the country in which they dwell good or bad? Are the towns they live in open or fortified? Is the soil rich or poor? Is it wooded or not? And take pains to bring back some of the fruit of the land."

These are all good and proper questions that any nation might seek in order to properly assess the state of the land that they wish to inhabit. Moses wants the scouts to find out if the land is rich in produce, if it will be easy or difficult for them to overtake, and if the land is well protected by its present occupants. The scouts return with their answers.

"At the end of forty days they returned from scouting the land. They went straight to Moses and Aaron and the whole Israelite community at Kadesh in the wilderness of Paran, and they made the report to them and to the whole community, as they showed them the fruit of the land. This is what they told him: "We came to the land you sent us to; it does indeed flow with milk and honey and this is its fruit. However the people who inhabit the country are powerful, and the cities are fortified and very large; moreover we saw the Anakites there. Amalekites dwell in the Negeb region. Hittites, Jebusites and Amorites inhabit the hill country; and Canaanites dwell by the Sea and along the Jordan."

Now remember that this group of scouts constitutes the leadership of the Israelite community. When asked by Moses to assess the land they bring back data that is factually correct as well as visible evidence to support their words. Yet they spread panic and fear among the people instead of hope. Why? Our commentary tells us that even though the report they delivered was factually correct, it was not the truth. Here is how the Etz Hayim commentary defines truth.

"Truth is more than a summary of empirical facts. It must include the response of the soul to those facts, and this is where the scouts failed in their duty. Although each of the scouts was supposed to be a leader in his own tribe, they did not anticipate the consequences of their words. They did not realize that by speaking their minds and giving voice to their own doubts, they would provoke panic among the people."

In other words, it wasn't the message that they delivered that disturbed and brought a rush of anxiety to their people. It was how the message was delivered. It was the media behind the message that crippled the Israelite community and caused panic among the people. What then is the lesson for the leadership of this congregation? It is not what they report but how they report it. Yes, facts are indisputable but they do not necessarily constitute the truth of any situation. Sure there were challenges in the wilderness and certainly there are challenges in congregational life in Judaism today. But the challenges we face, while daunting, are by no means insurmountable. As long as the leadership of this congregation sincerely believes that and repeatedly delivers that message we will not fail. In fact, the message will resonate and reverberate and spread among the wider community, take root and flourish.

President's Message

Following is a transcript of the speech I gave at my installation, for those that could not be there.

Rabbi Mishkin, Congregants, Fellow Board Members, Family and Friends,

Let me share a brief biography with you. I was born and grew up in Wilkes-Barre Pennsylvania. I was raised in a kosher home, attended an Orthodox synagogue and my life revolved around family and Jewish activities. I attended Hebrew Day School through 8th grade, public high school and graduated from University of Pittsburgh in 1976 with a BA in Economics. I met my wife Harriet at the teen bowling league at the local Jewish Community Center in 1971, and we are going strong 44 years later. Harriet and I lived in Forest Hills, New York, Woodbridge, New Jersey and settled in Old Bridge to raise our two sons. We are members at Beth Ohr for 28 years. I spent my entire business career (34 years) with the Nielsen Market Research Company.

I watch an interesting program on CNBC called *The Profit* (not Prophet) starring Marcus Lemonis. Marcus invests his own money in businesses that are failing. His main principle for success is that Product, Processes, and People within a business must work together efficiently to maximize profit.

I have a similar vision as the new President of our Synagogue.

Product: Our product has improved these past 12 months, thanks to our new Rabbi. But opportunities still exist to expand our product in the coming year. Fundraising events, renting out our facility and increasing membership are major challenges that the new board will focus on.

Processes: Clear communication and improved scheduling between board committees and other arms of the Synagogue will make us more efficient. Documenting ritual policy and organizing administrative procedures are underway.

People: As head of the Rabbi Search Committee I was thrilled when Joel Mishkin became our new Rabbi. He knew the challenges we faced here, offered solutions

during his interviews, has already implemented many of his ideas, and continues with optimism toward our future. We had a very smooth transition to replace our office administrator of 16 years with the hiring of Phyllis Greenberg. Allan Benish deserves all the credit for handling this, and I commend the rest of the Executive Board for giving of their time to train the new administrator. I want to thank all outgoing board members for volunteering, and a special acknowledgement to David Honig for serving as our President for the past 3 years. I welcome the new board and note that many board members from last year agreed to fill positions this year. Dedication to Beth Ohr from past presidents continues as eight past presidents regularly attend our weekly religious services, three will be on my Executive Board and two on the Regular Board. Quite impressive! This pattern of service is similar to past United States Presidents who continue to work to make our world a better place.

I recognize that our members are our greatest asset. I would be remiss if I didn't thank all the members who already volunteer on committees or just help out on the fly. But there are still two open positions on the new Board; House Chair and Programming Chair. So now I challenge you to volunteer and use some of the 8,736 hours available to each of you during the next 12 months to join the board or a committee. Don't forget you get Mitzvah Reward points that you cash in during the High Holy Days!

I look forward to leading our synagogue as your President for the coming year. I have outlined some of my life experiences which I will utilize as your leader. I am familiar with every member family, serving as your Financial Secretary. Members know me as a regular at religious services, leading Shiva minyans at your homes, serving on the Board and committees in the past, selling High Holiday tickets, and being honored by chanting the Haftorah on Yom Kippur. Or you may know me because I have a terrific spouse who continues to serve this Congregation and is a great speech writer!

Feeling very presidential this evening, I will paraphrase two United States Presidents from the 1960's. <u>John Fitzgerald Kennedy</u> ASK NOT WHAT YOUR SYNAGOGUE CAN DO FOR YOU BUT WHAT YOU CAN DO FOR YOUR SYNAGOGUE. <u>Richard Nixon</u> Let me make myself perfectly clear I AM THE PRESIDENT, and I declare that the Rabinowitz husband and wife presidencies at Beth Ohr are a reality whereas the Clinton presidencies are still a fantasy. 

Reason No 01. The Men's Club President (Ed) always provides free gifts like hats, T shirts, books, stamps and much more.




Men's Club Pancake Breakfast


