

Dear Congregant,

I have been working in tandem with the lay-leadership here at Congregation Beth Ohr to revitalize our synagogue in various ways. Hopefully you have noticed additional programming, increased attendance at adult education classes and continued vibrancy in the

Sisterhood, Men's Club, and Daytimers events. One of the ways in which we can accomplish the objective of revitalizing our synagogue is through the use of standard materials readily available to our movement. Several years ago the Rabbinical Assembly published the <u>Etz Hayim Humash</u>, Torah and Commentary. Most Conservative congregations use this wonderful resource in their services.

This book presents the weekly Torah readings, and Haftarot along with illuminating essays on such topics as Worship and Ritual, War and Peace, Civil and Criminal Law and Women in the Bible. Additionally the book features the Jewish Publication Society's translation of the Bible, Commentary, explanations and notes. All of these features are included to stimulate the learning process and introduce the reader to the unique perspective offered by the Conservative Movement.

As you may well know one of the ways in which you can honor or remember a beloved is by donating a prayer book that we use for our synagogue services. The Ritual Committee recently recommended that we channel new funds received for books into the purchase of this important work so that we could eventually have an inventory of them for the use of our general congregation on Sabbath and Festivals. This would greatly enhance the experience for the worshippers at Congregation Beth Ohr. To learn more about this resource you can speak to me or look at the Rabbinical Assembly website under publications. Additionally if you would like to donate one of these volumes you may contact Barbara Schneider of the Sisterhood. Donations such as this one are necessary and important. They are just one of the ways in which you can feel more a part of our synagogue and spread the joy of Judaism to your fellow congregants. Wishing you all a kosher and happy Pesach!

April Yahrzeits

The actual date that the Yahrzeit is observed is to the right of the name. It is customary to light a memorial candle on the eve of this date and to give tzedukah in memory of the deceased. One should recite the Mourner's Kaddish at services the evening before as well as the day of the Yahrzeit. The name of your departed will be read at the Friday evening and Shabbat morning services, the week before the Yahrzeit date which are represented by the dates in the columns which are in bold print.

MEKHIRAT <u>H</u>AMETZ (SALE OF LEAVEN 2015)

The Torah tells us that during Passover, "No leaven shall be found in your houses for seven days" (*Exodus* 12:19). The Rabbis understood this to mean that one could not own any hametz during the holiday. To prevent the financial hardship that would result from discarding all of one's leaven on an annual basis, the rabbis developed a legal mechanism whereby an individual could sell his/her leaven to a non-Jew for the duration of the holiday.

PLEASE REMEMBER that even if you plan to be away from home for the entire holiday, you must still sell all the \underline{h} ametz you own. Similarly, should you own other property, or store leaven products in your office, you must still sell the \underline{h} ametz stored at those locations.

While there is no charge for the selling of leaven, it is customary to include a charitable contribution with the "Sale of Leaven" form.

PLEASE FILL OUT THE FORM BELOW AND RETURN IT TO THE SYNAGOGUE OFFICE WITH YOUR TZEDAKAH DONATION MADE OUT TO THE "RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND" OR JEWISH FAMILY SERVICES NO LATER THAN THURSDAY, APRIL 2nd (YOU MAY, HOWEVER, GIVE IT TO RABBI MIAHKIN IN PERSON ON FRIDAY, APRIL 3RD AT THE FAST OF THE FIRST BORN SERVICE AT 7:00 A.M.)

THE UNDERSIGNED, BY HIS/HER/THEIR SIGNATURE(S), have herewith granted full Power-of-Attorney to Rabbi Joel Mishkin of Congregation Beth Ohr, concerning the sale of every product containing leaven or its derivatives in his/her/their possession, effective as of 11:00 PM. Eastern Daylight Saving Time, on the 14th day of the Hebrew month of Nisan which is the day before the First Seder that night. This power of attorney includes the right to rent to the purchaser all storage space, vessels and receptacles wherein such merchandise is currently found, binding, and may thus be enforced in the most effective manner in accordance with the laws of our Torah, as well as in accordance with the civil laws of the State of New Jersey.

Do a Mitzvah...Help Others Who Need Us

This year, Congregation Beth Ohr will once again participate in the Holiday Food Basket program for the Jewish Family Services. In this way, we can help needy families in our community to enjoy a traditional Pesach. JFS collects Passover food and prepares baskets for the families. Every family also receives supermarket vouchers so they can purchase fresh products to supplement the baskets. We can choose to donate Kosher For Passover food or we can make a cash donation.

Below is a sample list of foods that can be used in the baskets. If you have food to donate (please make sure everything is dated 2015), just place it in the food bin in the lobby of the Synagogue by Sunday, March 29th. 

Ingredients:

2 cups Semisweet Chocolate Chips
1 cup Pareve Margarine
1 tsp Ground Cinnamon
2 cups White Sugar
3/4 cup Potato Starch
2 tsp White Sugar

1/2 tsp Salt 6 Eggs

Directions

In a large bowl, put 2 cups sugar and margarine and whisk together, until smooth. Gradually add eggs into the mixture, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Take a separate bowl and put matzo cake meal, potato starch and salt in it. Mix well. Combine the above two mixtures together and add walnuts and chocolate chips. The mixture will become very sticky and heavy. Divide the mixture into 2-inch bars and flatten them out, to about 1/2" thickness. Grease a large cookie sheet and place the flattened mixture on it. Sprinkle a mixture of 2 teaspoons sugar and cinnamon on it. Preheat the oven to 350 degree F. Place the sheet in oven and bake for 50-55 min. Take out from the oven, let it cool and serve.

Holocaust survivor Frida Herskovits lights a candle at one of the ovens used to burn victims of the Holocaust at the Auschwitz concentration camp in Poland. She went back to visit the site in 1994.NORTH BRUNSWICK - Frida Herskovitswas born in Czechoslovakia 81 years ago, living with her mother, father and nine siblings.

"We had a wonderful life and it was nice there," she said. Then at the age of 17, her life changed forever. In 1944, the Germans came into her town with rifles and German shepherds, ordering the residents to take their personal belongings and leave within two hours. Herskovits' mom thought they were being brought to a labor camp, and wouldn't let a Christian neighbor hide her children. What they didn't know is that this was the beginning of the Holocaust.

"You should see what hate does. Hate kills and tortures and destroys people. That's why I go to tell my story," said Herskovits, who addressed social studies students at the North Brunswick Township High School on Jan. 17. Herskovits said she was brought to a brick factory where she had to sleep on the floor on top of the bricks. She was there for a few weeks, but the torture and killing started immediately. She said if someone disobeyed orders, they were shot on the spot.Many people died on the train ride to the site because of no food,water or air, and her mom and sister couldn't stop crying.



Herskovits was placed at three different concentration camps over the course of a year during World War II. She slept in these barracks at the Auschwitz camp."But we couldn't do nothing," she said. She said their hair was shaven and clothes were removed, and they were given one dress and a tattoo identification before being sent to the barracks, where five or six people would sleep in a bunk bed. With the laborers lined up on the right and the women and children on the left, she said she saw a baby shot to death, German shepherds "tear a baby out of the mother's womb" and people burned alive. There were even experimental surgeries in which organs were removed and human skin was used to make lampshades and picture frames.

Herskovits said she would have to work with rocks or pick cabbage in a field. The workers were fed a little soup and a piece of bread that "wasn't fit for any animal, but we were hungry." Anyone who was sick had gasoline poured over them in a pit and was burned.

"The screams were unbelievable," she said. "You were just told what to do and obey. Anybody who disobeyed was dead."

She was then sent on an open cargo train in freezing, rainy weather to another camp in Germany, which was filled with soot. She said that once every two days she'd get black coffee and a slice of bread, but no shower. She said people were constantly dying but were left there because there was no crematorium. She also said her sister was at this camp but did not recognize her because she looked like a skeleton.

In three different concentration camps for a year, Herskovits was finally freed by the British onApril 15, 1945. She went to a sanatorium in Sweden with her sister and later worked in a shoe factory since she knew how to sew. She later met up with her older brother, who was the only other survivor of her family, in Israel, although at first she was taken to a Cyprus military camp and then to Palestine. She eventually married her second cousin, had a son and then moved to the United States, first to Brooklyn, N.Y., and then to Monroe, seven years later, where she had another daughter.

In 1994, Herskovits returned to Auschwitz and saw the remains of the barracks, the crematoriums, the electric fence that surrounded the camp, piles of empty gas cans, preserved hair strands that were used for wigs and a monument honoring the dead. She said her childhood home is now a public school, and other houses were built on her property.

Reflecting on her time in Germany, which she said affected her so badly she couldn't close her eyes for a long time, she said she kept her faith and religion and never gave up.

"We all think positive," she said. "I don't think a person should ever give up....Sometimes things change and I believe in miracles. I am alive, is a miracle. I was standing in the middle of the fire and I am alive," she said.
