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# **How to Prepare for Rosh Hashanah**

Because there is so much at stake spiritually during Rosh Hashanah, we make preparations beginning a full month earlier. At Rosh Hodesh Elul, or the start of the

new month of Elul, we begin to stir with anticipation for this day of spiritual renewal. We set out our spiritual provisions by readying our minds for prayer and our hearts for forgiveness and by doing whatever we can to attain God's compassion and mercy when the Day of Judgment arrives.

# **Blowing the Shofar Before Rosh Hashanah**

The most prominent feature of the month of Elul is the sounding of the <u>shofar</u> each morning, except on Shabbat. Three primary reasons are given for this practice. The first one is to confuse Evil Inclination about the date for Rosh Hashanah, so that it will not be able to affect God's judgment of people with his accusations against them.



The second one pertains to a rabbinic legend, which says that Moses' ascent to receive the second tablets on the first of Elul was accompanied by blasts of the shofar. Therefore, the shofar reminds us of the story of the Golden Calf and that we must always be aware of our potential for sinning.

The third one has as its source the famous phrase heard at many weddings from the <u>Song of Songs(6:3)</u> *Ani l'dodi v'dodi li*, meaning "I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine." The first letters (*aleph, lamed, vav, lamed*) of each Hebrew word form an acrostic for the word Elul. From this hint, we gather that the period extending from the beginning of Elul through Yom Kippur (a total of 40 days) is a time ripe to become beloved by God. The shofar alerts us to that loving relationship.

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# Rabbi Mishkin's Message

# "An American Family"



Recently the news featured the story of an American family. Ghazala and Khzir Khan became household names when they appeared at the Democratic Convention in Philadelphia. As the world now knows, the Khans suffered a profound loss when their son, United States Army Captain Humayn Khan, was killed in 2004 during the Iraq War while protecting the men under his command. Following this great tragedy the Khans, like most parents, felt completely lost. They found a measure of healing when they moved to Charlottesville Virginia to be closer to their two living sons. The Khans also became deeply involved with the Army ROTC Center at the University of Virginia.

They dedicated a room there to the memory of their son. Inside the room, aptly named the "Khan Room" are several pictures of Captain Khan. There are clippings about him and memorial plaques. The Khans feel that this place is where their son's memory endures. It is a functional place, serving as a conference room, a place where prospective cadets might get interviewed or meetings held. When it is empty, cadets use it to study for exams. Tim Leroux, a retired lieutenant-colonel and former head of the ROTC Center, saw them as the "mom and pop of the department." The Khans attended all of the formal events conducted by the center. At the annual commissioning ceremony, Mr. Khan always spoke. When the cadets took the oath, he told them they needed to think hard about their pledge to defend the Constitution, to reflect on what they were pledging to defend, because his son died for that document. And he would give each graduate one of his pocket Constitutions. Then there would be an award presented, the Khan award, that went to that year's outstanding scholar-student.

Lieutenant-Colonel Leroux described Mr. Khan with the following words. "For years I've been telling people he is the most patriotic person I've ever met, and I've met quite a few. There are people who will put on cutoffs of the American flag and say they're patriotic. Or they'll put on bumper stickers – America, Love It or Leave It – and say they're patriotic. He has a much more profound idea of being patriotic. It's a complete understanding of what liberty and democracy mean."

There is much wisdom to be taken from the Khan's tragic experience and how they responded to it. Clearly the couple worked through their grief not only by memorializing their son in richly practical ways but also by contributing service to others. They graciously transmitted their values to the young cadets who took their son's place. Furthermore Lieutenant-Colonel Leroux describes Mr. Khan as patriotic, not because he keeps telling people that he is patriotic but because he demonstrates to them that he genuinely understands the meaning of liberty and freedom. He genuinely cherishes these values and wants others to cherish them as well.

All too often we pay lip-service to things that we say we believe in. It could be pride in our country or pride in our religion or even our love for Israel. But saying is not the same as doing something! Lip-service is not the same as action and as commitment. That is what makes the Khans so special and that is why their example should be admired and held such esteem.

# **Reciting Selihot, or Penitential Prayers**

Another important practice during Elul is the recitation of *Selihot* (literally, "forgivenesses"), which are penitential prayers and poems added to the daily morning prayers. This custom is based on a legend portraying King David as troubled over how the Israelites will be able to truly atone for their transgressions. God responds by advising him that the people should confess their sins by saying poems and prayers of penitence.

Sephardim (the Jews of Spain, Portugal, the Mediterranean basin, North Africa, the Middle East, and their descendants) recite Selihot for the entire month of Elul until Yom Kippur (except on Shabbat), early every morning. That 40-day span of time parallels the period that Moses spent on Mount Sinai.

However, *Ashkenazim* (the Jews of Central Europe and their descendants) follow a different tradition. They begin saying Selihot closer to the start of the holiday. Depending on the pattern of the calendar, recitation of Selihot begins either just after the Shabbat that precedes Rosh Hashanah or exactly a week earlier. (Because a minimum four days of saying Selihot is required, if Rosh Hashanah begins on a Tuesday or Wednesday, the saying of Selihot must be moved forward.)

The part of the Ashkenazic tradition that requires a minimum four days of selihot is based upon the laws about sacrifices during biblical times. The laws required isolating the perfect sacrificial animal from contact with other animals for four days to preserve it from becoming blemished. Consequently, we say selihot for at least four days to symbolically offer ourselves as a sacrifice. We meticulously engage in prayer and self-examination to rid ourselves of any spiritual defilement that might impede our pure commitment to God on the Day of Judgment.

Either way, the preferred hour for the first recitation in Ashkenazic tradition comes on Saturday night, *motzei Shabbat* (the "exit" of the Sabbath), rather than Sunday morning. Evening is the actual start of the Jewish day, and we honor a tradition by beginning at the earliest possible opportunity. In this case, however, Ashkenazim wait until midnight to say the first selihot because of a desire to extend the beauty of Shabbat until the last minute.

A 19th-century Russian rabbi, Yechiel Michel Ha-Levi Epstein, compiler of the *Arukh Ha-Shulhan*, offers a beautiful reason for the Ashkenazic motzei Shabbat tradition, a reason that he bases on the order of <u>Creation</u>. Human beings were created on the sixth day, or *erev Shabbat* (the day before Shabbat). The first full day of life for human beings was Shabbat, a time when things remain still. It is therefore appropriate that when Shabbat leaves on Saturday night, human beings express one of their primary purposes in life, which is to offer Selihot, passionate pleas of devotion to the Master of the Universe.

# **Adult Education and Program Highlights**

It's hard to believe the summer is half gone and we are looking at information about the High Holy Days. With the fall come an increased number of activities and more opportunity to be involved in them. Adult Education classes continue to flourish at Beth Ohr and we invite you to choose as many classes as you would like to attend.

**Rabbi Mishkin's classes** will continue on Tuesdays and Thursday mornings. His morning and evening class schedule can be found in our monthly newsletters, in e-mails, in our weekly Shabbat booklets that are available in the synagogue sanctuary, and on the Sisterhood calendar.

His every-other-Tuesday evening classes of **Practices and Customs 2.0** will begin this month as the class learns about the theology and philosophy of the various movements in Judaism while studying prayer books from each denomination.

On alternate weeks, Rabbi Mishkin will continue his study of Talmud, "Swim in the Sea of the Talmud." This class is also offered on Thursday mornings at 9:30. The Rabbi's book discussion class, reviewing the book Not in G-d's Name, continues every other Tuesday morning.

The **Conversational Spanish class** will resume on September 15. Terrie Polovsky assures me that anyone can join at any time. The class is held every Wednesday morning at 11:00 a.m.

The **Hebrew Reading class** will also continue, but with a twist. If you read Hebrew but would like to become more fluent, or if you would like to come practice reading while we discuss some of the High Holiday prayers, come to our **HEBREW CRASH COURSE - HIGH HOLY DAY VERSION**. This will be a six-week session concentrating on reading and discussing some of the most well-known prayers from Rosh HaShana and Yom Kippur. We will begin on Thursday, September 8.

Once we have finished with this session, we will continue the **Hebrew Reading/ Discussion class** that allows you to practice and brush up on your Hebrew while discussing the meanings of prayers from our Shabbat service, gaining some knowledge of the way Hebrew is constructed, learning some vocabulary, and just having a good time. Classes at 11 a.m. Thursdays

Its kind of like Ikea furniture needing only a screwdriver and several willing pairs of hands to bring it to life, just follow the easy direction. We expect that there will be both willing volunteers and enough hands to shortly accomplish this mitzvah by Rosh Hashana. Preparation of the new location for our new Sukkah has already begun.

In the meantime, you too can be part of the mitzvah. We ask that you make a small donation to offset the cost of the Sukkah. If each family contributes about \$20-25, we will be able to cover most, if not all, of the cost without adding to the congregational budget. We appreciate you are asked to donate to many worthy causes and that the total of each small donation increases the burden on your own personal budget. However, the new Sukkah structure is a tangible, physical improvement to our congregation, one that we will be able to see and spiritually enjoy each Sukkot season.

This improvement and our contributions to support it are signs that Beth Ohr continues as a vibrant congregation and, of course, your contributions are very much appreciated. A check in whatever amount you are able to contribute can be mailed to the office or brought to Phyllis Greenberg, our Synagogue Administrator, and marked new Sukkah.



# Why Israel is Important to Me

Israel is important to me as a Jew. Its politics don't concern me. The sometime arrogance that some Israelis show does not concern me. Its rigid religious right doesn't concern me. Its methods of reacting to unprovoked attacks are way beyond my areas of knowledge or expertise, so do not concern me. What concerns me is Israel's continued existence.

I don't live there and cannot ever imagine how it would be. I live in the United States and enjoy freedoms that did not exist when I was born in 1942 during the terrible destruction of European Jewry while anti-Semites in the U.S. prevailed over U.S. Government policy toward Jews in general and Jews in Europe that were enthusiastically slaughtered just because they were Jews. Whether the European Jews kept kosher, or went to Shul, or displayed mezuzahs, or completely did not identify themselves as Jews, they were trapped, beaten, tortured, starved, dehumanized, gassed and murdered. Many had no clue what was happening until they were herded and prodded into cattle cars.

Some understood what was happening but they had no place to go; no one to call attention to what was happening to them and no one to fight for them. Today, there is a place to go, God forbid that it is necessary. It is Israel. Today there is a nation that will call attention to what is happening. It is Israel. Today, there is a country that will use its vast resources, without fail, to fight in any way possible for Jews anywhere in the world that are being treated unforgivingly just because they are Jews. It is Israel.

And that is why Israel is important to me.

I usually ignore verbal attacks on Israel from anti-Semites or its sworn enemies – I don't like it, but it is expected. I do get upset by pseudo self-righteous Jews and by so-called liberals that do not support Israel's right to exist properly. I also consider politicians and elected officials that do not support Israel's right to exist with protected borders and peace with their neighbors as people that want to destroy the security I personally have because of Israel's existence.

Let's be realistic. In 1930 Germany, and Austria and Poland and Greece and The Netherlands and a dozen other countries, there were Jews living there that were proud citizens of each of these countries – valuable contributors, loyal, peaceful and very nationalistic. They fit in and while many of their neighbors were anti-Semitic they enjoyed a security provided by their government and the laws of their governments. A government they pledged allegiance to. Two thirds of these people were murdered while the world remained silent. The world including America! Our Jewish leaders were completely ineffective –afraid to speak out and with no leadership and with internal bickering among themselves. There was no Israel. I firmly believe that what happened in the 1930s through 1945 can never happen again as long as there is an Israel.

I fully support Israel and will not support anyone running for office that does not show a strong commitment toward Israel.

I am a proud American, a proud Jew and a proud supporter of Israel.



#### **BOOK REVIEW BY ED MENDLOWITZ**

# **Gutenberg's Apprentice**



The first printed book was the Bible and the project was started by Johann Gutenberg in 1452. I've occasionally seen pages and was suitably impressed. I never thought more about it until I read a novel I plucked off the new book section of my local public library – *Gutenberg's Apprentice* by Alix Christie.

Nothing just appears and neither did the first printed book. It took inventing not only the printing press, but the paper to print it on, the ink, design of the fonts, the layout of the pages, casting of the type, the metal alloys for the type, the concept of moveable type, hiring, training, scheduling and coordinating workers with different skills, financing the project over a few years, decisions of management for something that had never been done previously, maintenance of secrecy to assure the method wasn't stolen, distribution, marketing and selling of the Bibles, bribes to trade guilds and displacement of highly skilled scribes, political interfer-

ence, the general economy, the length of time the project took and even war. It was a major undertaking that most viewing a finished product usually don't give a second thought to.

This was during a time when many of today's management techniques and concepts did not exist. Many of these steps and processes are not dissimilar to what businesses do today.

The author has an obvious love of letterpress printing (she has set type and run presses) and used her feelings to craft a fine novel of what could have actually happened. The interesting story also provides much insight to how people lived and worked at the precipice of the Middle Ages and dawn of the Renaissance. I highly recommend this book.
