#### Rabbi Mishkin's Message

A Challenging Thought In Anticipation of our Sixtieth Anniversary



A few years back on a quiet morning in November a congregant came to see me. I was still in Florida at the time. She told me that she had a serious decision to make and would like my thoughts on the matter. Her name was Ruth. She was in her nineties. Ruth's husband had passed away several years prior. She lived in a small condo in Florida while her children and grandchildren were all in California. For her entire life Ruth had been a traditional Jew. She attended synagogue regularly, kept kosher, observed the holidays and genuinely cherished our tradition. Ruth had always thought that because of these religious inclinations she would prefer a traditional funeral service and burial.

However, now that Ruth's time on this earth was growing short, she was having second thoughts. So Ruth came in to see me. We spent a few moments exchanging pleasantries and then Ruth got to the point. She told me that since her husband had died and all of her children lived so far away she was no longer certain that she wished to be buried in a cemetery. Perhaps it made more sense for her to be cremated. Yes, her husband had been buried in Florida, but the truth of the matter was that, with the exception of the rare visit, her children's lives were in California. If she were to be buried it would need to be alongside her husband in Florida so a burial in California was out of the question. And then she said rather firmly, "I would never expect my children to come to Florida only so that they could visit their parents' graves." And so Ruth was leaning towards cremation which would essentially save her children and grand-children the inconvenience of traveling across the country. Her feeling was that her children had been good to her and her husband during their lives and it was almost foolish of her to be a burden to them in her death.

I have to admit, that while I was deeply saddened by Ruth's words, I was not surprised at her sentiment. Several of my congregants in Florida had chosen cremation in recent years for reasons such as the ones that Ruth was considering. Either they felt that there would be no one to visit their graves once they were gone or the expense of a funeral was, to their thinking, excessive. "Let them think of me as I once was rather than feel obliged to visit my grave," seemed to be a common thought these days. Life, not death, was what was important, they would tell me. And while I understood on an intellectual level what they saying, on a religious and emotional level it made me feel despondent. The very idea that somehow visiting the grave of a loved one is a burden troubles me deeply.

Yesterday morning on the seventh day of Passover we read from the Torah portion called *Beshallach*. It tells us of the sequence of events for the Israelites from the Exodus of Egypt to their crossing at the Sea at Reeds. If the observance of Passover is about anything, it is about the limited time that our ancestors had to leave Egypt. They clearly anticipated that Pharaoh, who had been given to changing his mind throughout the Ten Plagues, might do so again. Thus, they needed to leave Egypt in a hurry.

We read in the Torah: "The Israelites journeyed from Rameses to Succoth, about six hundred thousand men on foot, aside from children. Moreover, a mixed multitude went up with them, and very much livestock, both flocks and herds. And they baked unleavened cakes of the dough that they had taken out of Egypt, for it was not leavened, since they had been driven out of Egypt and could not delay; nor had they prepared provisions for themselves. The length of the time that the Israelites lived in Egypt was four hundred and thirty years."

The starting point of Passover is that the Israelites were in a frenetic rush and the dough did not have time to rise. That, in a nutshell, is the reason we do all that we do. And yet, as the Israelites are rushing off to freedom, their leader Moses is doing something completely different. While the Israelites are rushing off to freedom, Moses has other concerns.

"Now the Israelites went up armed out of the land of Egypt. And Moses took with him the bones of Joseph who had exacted an oath from the children of Israel, saying, "God will be sure to take notice of you: then you shall carry my bones up with you."

Imagine: While everyone else was rushing around frantically, occupied with the tasks of readying themselves for the journey that lay ahead, Moses was busy keeping the promise of Joseph's dying wish: "When God has taken notice of you, you shall carry my bones from here." The text does not tell us what was entailed in Moses' gathering of Joseph's bones. We don't know if he had to collect them from a sacred burial place. We only know that while he should have been rushing around with the other Israelites he chose to tend to the needs of a deceased ancestor, no matter how burdensome that might have been.

Which leads me to ask the following somewhat disturbing question. When did we begin to feel that being Jewish was supposed to be easy, was supposed to be without burden, and always convenient? It seems to me that this underlying sentiment is one of the reasons why the Jewish world faces the challenges it does these days. Let's face it - it's not just that it would be too inconvenient for Ruth's children to travel across country to visit her grave. We have allowed almost everything to be thought of as "too inconvenient" when it comes to our religion.

Think about our little synagogue for a moment. I believe that I have been around long enough now that I can ask the following question. And I hope that you will forgive my candor. But is it really the case that some people choose not to come to minyan on *Hol Hamoed* Sunday morning because they realize that the service for the holiday will take an additional thirty minutes? Can that really be the measuring stick that we rely upon when it comes to attendance? Yes, we have a small membership but clearly we should have at the very least a quorum of ten Jews at each and every service and anyone who has the obligation to say Kaddish for a loved one must be able to acquit themselves of that obligation every single time we meet.

I understand that many of you support our synagogue in so many important ways and how can more be expected of you? But what other choice do we have? If we really love this place, if we really love what we are doing here, then we have to guarantee that there will be a minyan no matter what. If each one of us made the commitment to come to just **one more service** each and every month, then what a difference that would make.

Yes, my friends, the truth of the matter is that it is inconvenient to be a Jew. It is inconvenient to be kosher. It is inconvenient to come to synagogue. It is inconvenient to say kaddish for eleven months for a parent. It is inconvenient to light Shabbat candles. It is inconvenient to give tzedakah. Almost everything about being a Jew is inconvenient. But that is also what makes being a Jew so precious and such an extraordinary blessing. *Vayikah Moshe et atzmot Yosef imo:* "And Moses took with him the bones of Joseph." Was that inconvenient at the time? You bet it was. But it was also the reason why Judaism has survived for thousands of years. And our task is no less inconvenient, and no less sacred - to guarantee that it survives for the next thousand years.

Roosevelt, originally called Jersey Homesteads, was created during the Great Depression as part of Roosevelt's New Deal. Its main purpose was to resettle Jewish garment workers. The town, conceived as an integrated cooperative project, was largely planned out by Benjamin Brown. The economy of the town consisted of a garment factory and farm. Artist Ben Shahn lived in the town and painted a fresco mural viewable in the Roosevelt Public School.

## Yom Hashoah Program



#### Yom Hashoah Program

Beth Ohr's Special Yom Hashoah Program on April 20 was led by Eva Wiener, one of the youngest passengers on the S.S. St. Louis, the ship that spawned the book and movie "Voyage of the Dammed." Ms. Wiener's presentation was moving, touching, insightful and made us outraged at the situation where our government did nothing to save the people on the ship. When the ship landed in Cuba only a small handful were permitted to leave. It seems those that left had genuine Visas while almost everyone else had visas that were set up to cause the voyagers to not be permitted to disembark in Cuba. This was a Nazi trick that the Cuban and United States governments supported. After the ship left Cuba it went to Miami where it was not permitted to dock, eventually traveling back to Europe. Eva's family was allowed to land in England. Al Engber, shown with his friend Annette Collins, was in Cuba at that time and remembers a cousin being allowed to leave the ship (after his Uncle paid considerable bribes). The Jews in Cuba offered to pay for all the Jews to leave, but the prearranged Nazi deceit stopped this from occurring except for the 27 or so people with "legitimate" documentation. American Anti-Semitism was rampant!

These "good and dear" friends missed an opportunity to honor and to hear and say some nice things while their friend was alive and could enjoy it, be happy and be complimented by the attendance and the support of an organization important to them.

My friends, life is too short and precarious and we should never pass up an opportunity to honor someone in life who we would drop everything for to go to that person's funeral.


