Celebration of NEW YEAR'S DAY IN THE UNITED STATES

January 2017 Newsletter highlighted New Year's around the world. This article talks about New Year's in the United States.

New Year's Day falls on January 1 and marks the start of a new year according to the Gregorian calendar. It marks the end of New Year's Eve celebrations in the United States and gives many Americans a chance to remember the previous year.

The start of New Year's Day, at midnight, is heralded by fireworks, parties and special events, which are often televised. Very few people have to work on the day itself. For many it is a day of recovery from the New Year's Eve celebrations the previous night. In some towns and cities, parades are held and special football games are played. The birth of the first baby in the New Year is often celebrated with gifts to his or her parents and appearances in local newspapers and on local news shows. Many people make New Year's resolutions. These are usually promises to themselves that they will improve something in their own lives. Common New Year's resolutions are to stop smoking or drinking alcohol, to lose weight, exercise more or to live a healthier lifestyle.

Government offices, organizations, schools and many businesses are closed in the USA on New Year's Day. Public transit systems do not run on their regular schedules. Where large public celebrations have been held, traffic may be disrupted by the clean-up operation. In general, public life is completely closed down.

A common symbol of New Year's Day is Baby New Year. This is often a male baby dressed in a diaper, a hat and a sash. The year he represents is printed on his sash. He is rarely a newborn baby, as many pictures show him sitting up or even standing alone. According to mythology, Baby New Year grows up and ages in a single year. At the end of the year he is an old man and hands his role over to the next Baby New Year. Other symbols of New Year's Day are spectacular fireworks exploding over landmarks and clocks striking midnight as the year begins.

"Winter is Coming"

December has come and gone and, with it, the winter has arrived. Ever since I moved to New Jersey from Florida I noticed that I have become more sensitive to the cold temperatures. Although I grew up in Hartford, Connecticut and spent an additional twelve years in New York and Baltimore, my eighteen years in Florida seemed to spoil me when it comes to the wintery months of January, February and March. Each year, as I clear the snow and scrape the windshield of my car, I can't help but feel some nostalgia for the winter months that I used to spend in Florida. They obviously were pleasant. Most days the humidity had dropped, the skies were clear and snow was forever absent from our lives. Of course, I conveniently forget just how oppressive the heat and humidity were from May through October and how nice it is to experience once again the change of seasons, but isn't that always the case that we forget the pleasantries of spring when we are confronted with the cold of winter.

Something else I have noticed around this time of year is that, beginning with the month of December, we seem to experience more than the ordinary number of deaths in our congregation and in the larger community. I am not certain why this happens. Perhaps it has something to do with the change of weather, or perhaps the onset of the holidays brings with it feelings of despondency or loneliness. But for as long as I have been practicing as a rabbi I have noticed that the winter months tend to be lonelier, grayer and more trying than the springtime and the summer.

However, I have also learned over the years that one of the surest antidotes to these kinds of feelings is to surround ourselves with the sense of community during this season. While some of us can experience this sense through social media and other formats of technology there is really no substitute for people coming together with other people. When I think of the many reasons why our congregants come to the synagogue one of the most compelling reasons is the feeling of community. There is, each and every Shabbat and Sunday, a small but strong core of members who come to Shul, not only for spiritual sustenance but also for companionship and fellowship. So during the next three months why not find the time to spend either a Friday evening, Saturday or Sunday morning in our synagogue. Not only will you be assisting us with assuring that we always have a necessary minyan but I believe firmly that you will also find meaning, inner peace and friendship that otherwise just might be missing from your lives.



President's Message

As we move into the New Year the Board of Directors is actively working on (1) the Rabbis, contract, (2) the 2019-2020 budget, (3) the slate of officers for the upcoming fiscal year and (4) Synagogue Security.

- 1. A new contract for Rabbi Mishkin as his current contract is up for renewal at the end of June. We are currently in discussion with him and I will report on it when appropriate.
- 2. The preparation of the 2019-2020 fiscal year budget. The timeline calls for the preliminary budget to be presented to the Board at the January meeting with Congregational review/approval in the Spring.
- 3. The preparation of the slate of officers for the 2019-2020 fiscal year. Please contact me if you are interested in serving on the Board as soon as possible as this will be voted on at the Spring Congregational Meeting. It is really important to have new faces on the Board.
- 4. Synagogue security. In December we had a detective from the Old Bridge Police department meet with our Security Task Force to perform a security assessment and make recommendations. Additionally we are working on scheduling the detective to come to the Synagogue sometime in January to make a presentation to the Congregation.


