Rabbi's Message

The Art of "Binging" in Synagogue

As some of you know, I have begun a new class on the Philosophy of Abraham Joshua Heschel. It takes place every

Thursday morning at 9:30am and you will be most welcome if you choose to attend: These are some of my thoughts about Heschel from a recent Shabbat morning:

How can you cultivate an even deeper faith and become a more deeply religious person than you already are? That is a question Abraham Joshua Heschel asks. If you know anything about Heschel you know that he always worked on such matters even though he was an observant and deeply religious Jew. Descended from an illustrious lineage of Hasidic royalty, Heschel was not satisfied with the life of observance that he witnessed among the most traditional of adherents.

At the outset of his book, "God In Search of Man," Heschel states a complaint with religious life. "It is customary to blame secular science and anti-religious philosophy for the eclipse of religion in modern society. It would be more honest to blame religion for its own defeats. Religion declined not because it was refuted but because it became irrelevant, dull, oppressive, insipid. When faith is completely replaced by creed, worship by discipline, love by habit; when the crisis of today is ignored because of the splendor of the past; when faith becomes only an heirloom rather than a living fountain; when religion speaks only in the name of authority rather than with the voice of compassion - its message becomes meaningless."

Imagine that Heschel wrote these words in 1955, but they resonate every bit as much today. Why is this the case? Heschel attributed a lack of faith and religiosity in his day to a lack of effort. He used the Talmud as evidence. Citing the Torah's verse, "If you search there for the Lord your God, you will find Him, if only you seek Him with all your heart and all your soul," he then adds the words of a sage - "If a man says to you, I have labored and not found, do not believe him. If he says, I have not labored but still have found, do not believe him. However if he says, I have labored and found, you may believe him." To which Heschel concludes, "It is true that in seeking Him we are assisted by Him. But the initiative and intensity of seeking Him are within our power." Simply put, you have to work at finding God.

So let's consider this philosophy in our daily lives but today. I wish to confess that I, your rabbi, in the late hours of the evening after my work is done, will indulge in "binging" on many of the hundreds of series and thousands of offerings that are available to us today through Netflix, Amazon and the like. I have always felt a little guilty about this - that is, until I read the reflections of the novelist Ben Dolnick who recently wrote a column titled, "Why You Should Start Binge-Reading Right Now."

Dolnick writes, "One night a couple of summers ago the power went out and, unable to watch Netflix or engage in my customary internet fugue, I lit a candle and picked up a thriller by Ruth Rendell. For the first time in as long as I could remember, my sole source of entertainment for an evening was going to be a book. And yes, yes, just as you'd expect, it was wonderful, it was cozy. But what struck me more than the night's general delightfulness was how much my experience of reading the book was influenced by the speed with which I was suddenly moving through it. To that point, I'd been reading the book the way I usually read books, which is to say in five- or 10-minute snatches before bed. And I'd been more or less enjoying it — watching Rendell's criminal protagonist get out of prison, following along as he searched for his victim — but I'd been enjoying it the way a person enjoys hors d'oeuvres at a cocktail party. Those cheese puffs are delicious; I just wish I could sit down with a plate of them. Now, by reading for an hour or two straight, I'd found my way into the caterer's tent. I could savor the particular tart flavor of the author's voice. I could admire the elegance of the trap she was setting for her doomed criminal. Before my storm-induced Rendell marathon, I'd been reading the wrong way. John Gardner, the literary critic, wrote that the job of the novelist is to create a "vivid and continuous dream" for the reader, but I'd somehow developed a case of readily sleep apnea. I'd gotten into the habit of consuming novels so fitfully that I was all but sealed off from their pleasures."

In other words, Mr. Dolkin reads like most of us, with distractions, interruptions, and lack of concentration. But there is a problem with this.

"I had accidentally discovered one of the great disadvantages of books (a medium that is not exactly short on disadvantages at the moment). Unlike Netflix, there is no team of brilliant and vaguely sinister engineers cooking up ways to get you binge reading. There is no auto-play technology frictionlessly delivering you from one chapter of the novel you're reading to the next. There is only you, alone in the silence of your room with a chapter break before you and your phone cooing at you from the dresser."

"However, there can be a payoff, in book after book, if you do push on through one chapter break, and then on through the chapter break after that, something amazing happens. Subplots that would once have been murky to the point of incomprehensibility (what was the deal with that dead sea captain again?) step into the light. Little jokes and echoes, separated by dozens or even hundreds of pages, come rustling out of the text forest. You will, in other words, find yourself propelled through a book that would once have been a multiseason dead weight in your tote bag."

Now, you might ask yourself, what do Abraham Joshua Heschel and Ben Dolnick have in common? They are both seekers of something that ineffable and elusive - and the answer for both is a simple one. "If a man says to you, I have labored and not found, do not believe him. If he says, I have not labored but still have found, do not believe him. However if he says, I have labored and found, you may believe him."

Synagogue worship, studying the Torah or Shakespeare takes effort, concentration and attentiveness. The answer might actually be found in "binging," so when you study and when you pray - focus, shut out the distractions and concentrate on seeking God and maybe one of these days you will find Him.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It is hard to believe that it was just two years ago that I was first installed as the President of Beth Ohr. My major objective then, and now as I leave office, is the continued success of the Synagogue. Linda and I have been members for over 43 years and it is truly family to us.

Financially we initiated the program known as "Securing Our Future". At this point we have surpassed 80% of our financial goal with almost 40% participation. I really think we can reach our goal or surpass it.

During this past year physical/personal security has become a major issue. Stan Perlman and I attended various presentations and we have:

- Met with the Old Bridge Police
- Had a congregational presentation concerning safety in active shooter situations by Old Bridge Detective Patrick Donofrio
- Been working to make facility changes which would enhance our safety and security
- Applied for a security grant; thanks to Terrie Polovsky



Shavuot

Shavuot, also known as the Festival of Weeks, commemorates the revelation of the Torah on Mt. Sinai to the Jewish people, and occurs on the 50th day, after the 49 days of counting the Omer. Shavuot is one of the three biblically based pilgrimage holidays known as the **shalosh regalim**. It is associated with the grain harvest in the Torah. The holiday is observed on the 6th to 7th of the month of Sivan This year the Holiday begins Sunset on June 8, 2019 to Nightfall June 10, 2019

Shavuot is observed by abstaining from work and attending synagogue services. A few special readings are recited: a liturgical poem called **Akdamut**, which emphasizes the greatness of God; the Book of Ruth, because the story highlights one woman's choice to join the Jewish people and accept the Torah; and the Ten Commandments, in honor of the revelation of the Torah. It is also customary to study Torah all night; this practice is called **Tikkun Leil Shavuot**.

Traditional holiday meals on Shavuot center around dairy foods. Milk is considered to be a symbol of the Torah, which nourishes the people directly, as milk does for a baby. Popular Shavuot foods include cheesecake, blintzes, and kugels. Some Sephardic Jews make a seven-layered bread called **siete cielos**
