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Rabbi's Message



"Antisemitism Here and Now"

I have been conducting a book discussion group since coming to Congregation Beth Ohr four and a half years ago. In general the group comes to a decision on a prospective book through my recommendations along with their preferences. However I have decided to choose the next book for the group because of its relevance and importance to the Jewish world. In the past two years we have witnessed a large number of antisemitic disturbances across the globe. In this country alone what happened in Charlottesville, Virginia and at the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania will forever haunt the Jewish communities. Given this rise in antisemitic events I will ask my book-discussion group to read a new work by Deborah E. Lipstadt, the Dorot Professor of Modern Jewish History and Holocaust Studies at Emory University. The title of the book is "Antisemitism Here and Now."

After the noticeable rise in both antisemitic incidents and rhetoric that target Jewish students and Jewish organizations on American college campuses along with the emergence of the white nationalist movement in America, Professor Lipstadt decided to take a new look at one of the world's oldest problems - hatred of the Jewish people. In a series of letters responding to an imagined college student and imagined colleague Professor Lipstadt attempts to answer the following questions. Where is all this hatred coming from? Is there any significant difference between left-wing and right-wing antisemitism? What role has the anti-Zionist movement played? And what can be done to combat the latest manifestations of this ancient hatred?

In a note on the book's jacket, "Acclaimed historian Deborah Lipstadt gives us her own superbly reasoned, brilliantly argued and certain to be controversial responses to these troubling questions." If you have never attended our book discussion group, before this might just be the time to join us on alternate Tuesday mornings at 11am when we'll read together, "Antisemitism Here and Now." We will begin our reading of this book on Tuesday, March 12th. Please call Phyllis if you are interested in attending the class and purchasing the book.

PURIM 101

The Book of Esther

The story of Purim is told in the book of Esther. The heroes of the story are Esther, a beautiful young Jewish woman living in Persia, and her cousin Mordecai, who raised her as if she were his daughter. Esther was taken to the house of Ahasuerus, King of Persia, to become part of his harem. King Ahasuerus loved Esther more than his other women and made Esther queen, but the king did not know that Esther was a Jew, because Mordecai told her not to reveal her identity.

The villain of the story is Haman, an arrogant, egotistical advisor to the king. Haman hated Mordecai because Mordecai refused to bow down to him, so Haman plotted to destroy the Jewish people. In a speech that is all too familiar to Jews, Haman told the king, "There is a certain people scattered abroad and dispersed among the peoples in all the provinces of your realm. Their laws are different from those of every other people's, and they do not observe the king's laws; therefore it is not befitting the king to tolerate them. The king gave the fate of the Jewish people over to Haman, to do as he pleased with them. Haman planned to exterminate all of the Jews.

Mordecai persuaded Esther to speak to the king on behalf of the Jewish people. This was a dangerous thing for Esther to do, because anyone who came into the king's presence without being summoned could be put to death, and she had not been summoned. Esther fasted for three days to prepare herself, then went into the king. He welcomed her. Later, she told him of Haman's plot against her people. The Jewish people were saved, and Haman and his ten sons were hanged on the gallows that had been prepared for Mordecai.

Purim Customs and Observances

Purim is celebrated on the 14th day of Adar, which is usually in March. The 13th of Adar is the day that Haman chose for the extermination of the Jews, and the day that the Jews battled their enemies for their lives. On the day afterwards, the 14th, they celebrated their survival. In cities that were walled in the time of Joshua, Purim is celebrated on the 15th of the month, because the book of Esther says that in Shushan (a walled city), deliverance from the massacre was not complete until the next day. The 15th is referred to as Shushan Purim.

In leap years, when there are two months of Adar, Purim is celebrated in the second month of Adar, so it is always one month before Passover. The 14th day of the first Adar in a leap year is celebrated as a minor holiday called Purim Katan, which means "little Purim." There are no specific observances for Purim Katan; however, a person should celebrate the holiday and should not mourn or fast. Some communities also observe a "Purim Katan" on the anniversary of any day when their community was saved from a catastrophe, destruction, evil or oppression.

The word "Purim" means "lots" and refers to the lottery that Haman used to choose the date for the massacre.

The Purim holiday is preceded by a minor fast, the Fast of Esther, which commemorates Esther's three days of fasting in preparation for her meeting with the king.

The primary commandment related to Purim is to hear the reading of the book of Esther. The book of Esther is commonly known as the Megillah, which means scroll. Although there are five books of Jewish scripture that are properly referred to as megillahs (Esther, Ruth, Ecclesiastes, Song of Songs, and Lamentations), this is the one people usually mean when they speak of The Megillah. It is customary to boo, hiss, stamp feet and rattle gragers (noisemakers) whenever the name of Haman is mentioned in the service. The purpose of this custom is to "blot out the name of Haman."

We are also commanded to eat, drink and be merry. According to the Talmud, a person is required to drink until he cannot tell the difference between "cursed be Haman" and "blessed be Mordecai," though opinions differ as to exactly how drunk that is. A person certainly should not become so drunk that he 6 might violate other commandments or get seriously ill. In addition, recovering alcoholics or others who might suffer serious harm from alcohol are exempt from this obligation.

In addition, we are commanded to send out gifts of food or drink, and to make gifts to charity. The sending of gifts of food and drink is referred to as shalach manos (lit. sending out portions). Among Ashkenazic Jews, a common treat at this time of year is hamentaschen (lit. Haman's pockets). These triangular fruit-filled cookies are supposed to represent Haman's three-cornered hat. It is customary to hold carnival-like celebrations on Purim, to perform plays and parodies, and to hold beauty contests. I have heard that the usual prohibitions against cross-dressing are lifted during this holiday, but I am not certain about that. Americans sometimes refer to Purim as the Jewish Mardi Gras.

Purim is not subject to the Sabbath-like restrictions on work that some other holidays are; however, some sources indicate that we should not go about our ordinary business on Purim out of respect for the holiday.

TRADITIONAL HAMENTASHEN

What You Will Need

Baking Sheets Parchment Paper Large Bowl Whisk Wooden Spoon Rolling Pin 3 3/4 inch Round Cookie Cutter Wire Racks

Ingredients

4 large eggs
1 cup sugar
¹/₂ cup canola or vegetable oil
Juice (2 Tbsp). and zest (1¹/₂ tsp.) of one medium lemon
1 tsp. pure vanilla extract
5 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for dusting
2 tsp. baking powder
¹/₂ tsp. kosher salt
1 ¹/₂ cups (1¹/₂ lb.) filling, such as apple or prune butter, strawberry or apricot preserves

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350°F and line 4 cookie sheets with parchment paper.

In a large bowl, add the eggs and sugar and whisk until light and foamy. Add the oil, lemon juice and zest, and vanilla extract, and stir to combine. Add the flour, baking powder, and salt, and use a wooden spoon or stiff rubber spatula to stir well until a stiff, homogenous dough forms. Lightly flour a clean work surface and turn the dough out onto the surface. Press it into a cohesive mass, then use a rolling pin to roll the dough out to an even ¼-inch-thick sheet. Use a 3¾inch round cookie cutter or the rim of a glass to punch circles in the dough. Pull the scraps away from the circles and set aside to be rerolled once. Using a tablespoon or a small scoop, portion 1 heaping tablespoon of filling into the center of each circle. Fold in the dough from three sides and press the edges together to seal, leaving a small opening over the filling. When all of the cookies are shaped, place them 2 inches apart on the prepared baking sheets. Bake the cookies until lightly browned on the bottom and just set throughout, 18-22 minutes. Remove and let the cookies cool on the baking sheet for 1 minute, then transfer to wire racks to cool completely. Makes about 35 cookies. Prep and baking time about 1 hour.

BETH OHR CEMETERY







Message to the Congregation from Ed Mendlowitz, Men's Club President

We have a fair number of people that periodically attend a Sunday Minyan because they have a Yahrzeit. This also occurs on Shabbos morning and for the Friday evening service. We appreciate your attendance and support and are pleased to provide the minyans.

Recently attendance at all three services has been declining for various reasons, but the winter months always has fewer people. I would make a request that everyone that comes for a Yahrzeit "pay" for it by coming an extra time when you would not have ordinarily come. This way we can be assured that we have minyans all the time for everyone that wants to come for that purpose.

So, assuming you regularly come 3 times a year for a Yahrzeit, then I suggest you come an extra 3 times a year when you would not have come, so that we can be assured of a minyan for those that need it. Your "payment" would be in kind. One extra time for every time you come for a Yahrzeit.

Think about it. It is not so onerous and can be very helpful if you are the 10th person at a service.

And might I suggest Sunday mornings. The minyan starts at 9:00 and is over at 9:50. You can also stay for a bagel, some extras and great camaraderie. Think about it and I hope to see you at Shul.
