Six Ways to Prepare for the High Holidays



As summer winds down and the back-to-school season approaches, so, too, do the High Holidays of Rosh HaShanahand Yom Kippur, which mark the beginning of the Jewish New Year. Our tradition provides us with several reminders of the upcoming Days of Awe (*Yamim Noraim* in Hebrew), as well as ways we can prepare during Elul, the Hebrew month that precedes them.

1. Make time for spiritual self-reflection and study.

Elul traditionally is a time to engage in spiritual self-reflection and evaluation. As we face our transgressions and strive to be better people in the coming year, it's equally important to focus on self-care and our own spiritual nourishment. The Hebrew letters that comprise the word Elul – aleph, lamed, vav, lamed – are an acronym for "Ani l'dodi v'dodi li," a verse from Song of Songs that means "I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine." Most often interpreted as love poetry between two people, the phrase also reflects the love between God and the Jewish people, especially at this season, as we assess our actions and behaviors during the past year and hope for blessings in the coming year.

Elul is also traditionally a time for study. Beginning in the 16th century, Jews began to prepare for the High Holidays by studying a midrashic text, *Maaseh Avraham Avinu* (The Tale of Abraham our Patriarch). Exploring the early life of Abraham, this midrash (interpretation of a biblical narrative or story) reflects on the themes of Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur *A Faith-ful Heart* by Rabbi Benjamin Levy offers a translation and commentary on this text that takes readers on a journey of spiritual preparation. This Is Real and You Are Completely Unprepared: The Days of Awe as a Journey of Transformation, a book by Alan Lew, and *Jewels of Elul*, a daily email that contains brief stories and anecdotes from a variety of sources, are other selections that may offer inspiration at this season.

2. Involve children in holiday preparations.

The Days of Awe can be made more meaningful for the children in our lives if we take time to involve them in holiday preparations. For example, polishing silver, setting the table, and helping prepare special holiday foods all are great ways to engage children in preparing for the

Rabbi's Message

Babi Yar - 10 Av 5779

This message was offered by Rabbi Mishkin on Tisha B'Av at the Marlboro Jewish Center.

One of the things that I have learned from my congregants over the years is that we Jews frequently travel with a particular eye. That is, wherever it is that we journey - be it near or far, we will always pause during those journeys to see communities where Jews are or have been present. We visit synagogues and we visit neighborhoods in search for the existence of Jewish life or the evidence that at one time a Jewish community did exist. That is true of a recent trip that my wife and I made through the Ukraine. Beginning with the city of Odessa and ending with the Ukrainian capital, Kiev we were able to take a glimpse into the life of the relatively spare Jewish community that presently lives there as well as remember the thriving world of Judaism that once populated the landscape there, particularly before the Second World War.

Two images have stayed with me since our journey that I believe are most appropriate to this day of the Hebrew calendar year - the ninth day of Av - the most somber and saddest day in Jewish history. We all recognize that Tisha B'Av represents not only our remembrance of the destruction of the two sacred temples in Jerusalem - the first in 586 BCE and the second in 70 CE - but also other times which will live in infamy that happened on that day. In other words the ninth day of Av serves as a continual reminder that we Jews have suffered at the hands of others over the centuries and yet we have consistently demonstrated our resilience and our collective strength in facing and recovering from those devastating tragedies.

The visit to Kiev, Ukraine's thriving capital was the highlight of our journey. It demonstrated the strength of the Ukrainian people at their very best - it is a beautiful and graceful city, dotted with lovely parks, neighborhoods and sophisticated European eateries. However one sparkling afternoon we went to a place called Babi Yar, in English, the old women's ravine. Today, it remains a densely wooded ravine, but in the bright sunshine, its dark message fades. There we remembered the storied history of the Jewish people of Eastern Europe - where over 160,000 Jews resided in this metropolis. In 1941 Jews constituted about twenty percent of the city's population.

In 1941 German forces occupied Kiev and approximately 100,000 Jews fled in advance of the occupation. On September 19, 1941 the German forces entered Kiev and along with the rest of the Ukraine the city was incorporated into the Reichskommissariat Ukraine, headed by East Prussian Nazi district leader, Erich Koch. During the first days

of the occupation two major explosions, apparently set off by Soviet military engineers, destroyed the German headquarters in the city center. The Germans then used the sabotage as a pretext to murder the entire remaining populations of the Jews of Kiev. At that time there were about 60,000 Jews in the city, most of them women, children and the elderly. On September 29-30, 1941 the SS and German police units murdered the Jewish population of Kiev at Babi Yar, just northwest of the city. That Sunday we visited that site, the site of one of the largest mass murders to take place during the Second World War. The remaining Jews of Kiev were murdered in small groups surrounding the massive ravine and according to reports 33,731 Jews were massacred in two days. In the months to follow German authorities killed thousands more Jews at Babi Yar, as well as non-Jews, Gypsies, Communists and Soviet prisoners of war. In all it is estimated that 100,000 people were murdered at Babi Yar.

That is one image I will not forget from our journey. The other image happened in Odessa during the first days of our trip. The days in Odessa were marked by the scorching heat that plagued most of Europe last week and we walked through the streets under the blistering sun. We stopped along the way at a beautiful, well-used synagogue. We happened to arrive at the same time that the rabbi of the shul was walking into the place. He was young, vibrant and most enthusiastic to welcome us. The synagogue was bright and in pristine condition and thankfully air-conditioned. We walked among the pews peering at siddurim and chumashim and immediately recognized that Jewish life continues even in a part of the world where it had once been decimated. That is the image I wish to take away from our journey - that once again we Jews have suffered at the hands of others who wished to do us harm, and that we continue to grieve for the innocent souls who perished, but we also take comfort in the knowledge that we continue to exist, to thrive and to live. That ultimately is the message of the 9th Day of Av. Through it all, we Jews shall prevail.

Here are some of the tasks that need to be done - Chairs setup, Siddur to Makzor changeover, Tallit cleaning, change of ark and bema covers, Silver polishing, ticket sales, sermons, service order and preparation, etc. I know I missed some things in this list. The bottom line is that it takes the community to get everything done. We need your help to do some of these things. Give us an hour or so to help us have the type of services and environment to which we have become accustomed. Please let Chuck Rogol, the Rabbi or me know if you can help in any of these tasks. I will look forward to seeing all of you and meeting members of the Temple that I don't know at services.

If you have any concerns or suggestions, please do not hesitate to contact me. There is one caveat to this, though. I would prefer not to discuss Temple business on Shabbos and would appreciate if you would respect this request. Have a great month and I will look forward to seeing you in the near future.

Dear Congregant,

As you know, our congregation runs a large deficit each year and your Board is constantly looking for ways to cut costs wherever possible. One such expense has been identified.

In the last fiscal year, we spent over \$1,400 in credit card fees. These fees were incurred for the convenience of some of our members who use credit cards to pay for services received from our synagogue such as dues, high holiday tickets, etc.

We had two options to eliminate or reduce the fees. The first was to eliminate the use of credit cards and the second is to pass these convenience fees back to the members who take advantage of this opportunity.

Effective September 1, 2019 we will begin charging a 3.5% convenience fee whenever a credit card is used. The fee will be added onto the amount being charged at the time the charge is incurred.

Days of Awe. Tina Wasserman's cookbook for kids, *Entrée to Judaism for Families*, provides essential tools for helping children learn to cook with confidence, with clear, step-by-step instructions for every recipe and tips for adults to make the experience safe and rewarding. Reading stories with young children is another way to help them get excited about the Jewish New Year. Many authors have written children's books for the High Holidays. *Sophie and the Shofar*, for example, is a delightful tale about a dog named Farfel and a shofar that has gone missing.

3. Visit the cemetery.

It is customary for Jews to visit the graves of friends and relatives in the days prior to Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur. We recall our loved ones in the *Yizkor* liturgy on Yom Kippur and visiting their graves during Elul often provides us with the opportunity to reflect on their lives and to feel a renewed sense of closeness and connection to them. Visiting the graves of loved ones also can add poignancy and perspective to the High Holidays.

4. Plan a High Holiday menu.

For those who love to cook, Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur offer a time to make family favorites and try new recipes. Spending Elul thinking about and planning to prepare holiday recipes is a wonderful way to get ready for the New Year, a time during which we often host friends and family. Frequently, fond memories of Jewish holidays center on family gatherings and delicious meals. In *Entrée to*

Judaism, Tina Wasserman, offers an international array of recipes for Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, as well as a fascinating look at the traditions behind many of the foods we eat.

5. Listen to the sounds of the High Holidays.

Customarily, the shofar (a ram's horn) is sounded daily during the month of Elul (except on Shabbat), both as a reminder that the shofar will be blown on Rosh HaShanah and as a wakeup call of sorts, reminding us of the upcoming High Holidays and urging us to begin our preparations. Also during Elul, we add Psalm 27 to our worship services. Beginning with the words, "Adonai is my light and my help; whom should I fear?" this psalm beseeches God to protect us from our enemies and urges us to put our faith in God. Listening to the memorable tunes of the Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur liturgy can also help us reacquaint ourselves with the sounds of this time of year. Whether you listen to *Avinu Malkeinu* during a quiet time of the day, *Shiviti Adonai* on a walk, or *Al Cheit* on an iPod before bed, familiar melodies can both summon memories of long ago and help you look forward to the New Year.

6. Attend Selichot services.

The month of Elul culminates with *Selichot* (which literally means "forgiveness") services, when we gather in our congregations to recite special prayers of penitence that include beautiful Jewish religious poetry. This year Congregation Beth Ohr and Marlboro Jewish Center will be visiting Temple Beth Ahm of Aberdeen for *Selichot* services on Saturday evening. September 21, 2019 at 8:30PM. Customarily, Jews recite *Selichot* beginning late at night on the Saturday before Rosh HaShanah. (Depending on the calendar, congregations may observe *Selichot* in the hours before midnight on the Saturday night a week prior to Rosh HaShanah.) This moving service urges us to reflect on the year that is ending. With strains of the High Holiday melodies as a backdrop, we utter our first confession of the season, as well as *Sh'ma Koleinu*, asking God to hear our voices.

Why is it customary to visit loved ones' graves before or during the High Holidays?

Why is it customary to visit loved ones' graves before or during the High Holidays? Jewish tradition gives structure to many aspects of mourning as a way to create order at a time when mourners may feel unmoored. Our tradition offers guidance that suggests when to visit a grave and cautions against visiting *too often*, lest the visits keep us from living full lives that include joyous occasions. Indeed, Jeremiah 22:10 proclaims: "Weep ye not [too much] for the dead." Many Jews make a point of visiting loved ones' graves during the Hebrew month of Elul just prior to the onset of the High Holidays, on the day before Rosh HaShanah or Yom Kippur. During this season, some congregations hold communal memorial services (sometimes called "Kever Avot" or "ancestors' graves").

Visiting the graves of loved ones prior to the High Holidays helps connect us to the holidays' themes of renewal, repentance, reflection, and growth through memories of our loved ones. Visiting these graves can add poignancy and perspective to the High Holidays.

Other appropriate days to visit graves include Tishah B'Av (the 9th day of the Hebrew month of Av, a general day of mourning numerous Jewish events throughout history), on a loved one's *yahrzeit* (anniversary of the death), birthday, or other special days. Jewish practice also provides for a regular, structured, communal expression of reminiscence through *Yizkor*, which is observed several times during the year.

Jews historically do not visit graves on Shabbat, Hanukkah, or the middle days of Passover or Sukkot, which are joyous, celebratory holidays.






