Naso

Numbers 4:21-7:89

Parsha name

Naso: Take. G-d commands Moses to take another census.

The Gutnick Edition Chumash The Book of Numbers © 2005 Chaim Miller says that the literal meaning of Naso is "lift" and refers to the Torah lifting our existence to a higher plane. The book further explains that this Torah reading is always around Shavuot – either immediately before or after. Shavuot celebrates receiving the Torah, the ultimate uplifting event.

Torah portion summary and selections

More duties of the Levite; Levite census completion [after all this *is* the book of Numbers]; some ritual rules; and the law of the Nazirite. The Priestly Blessing: "The L-rd bless thee, and keep thee; The L-rd make His face to shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee; The L-rd lift up His countenance upon thee, and give thee peace." The last chapter of this parsha is the longest chapter of the Torah, with 89 verses, and describes the gifts of the princes of the twelve tribes. FYI, each of the twelve gifts are exactly the same. Why? And G-d and Moses have a "talk." G-d has another job for Moses, one He deems even more important than the Tabernacle; but this is described in the next parsha.

"Take the sum of the sons of Gershon also...

Numbers 4:22

The descendants of Levi, who were to minister the sanctuary, were to be counted. The Kohathites were given the honor of being counted first. Now the Gershonites were to be counted, and the above wording says "also." Why were they distinguished by "also?" They were the eldest and should have been counted first, but the Kohathites were considered more important since their job in the Temple was much more significant. When the count started, the Gershonites thought they were going to be passed over, so the word "also" was put in to indicate that they were also to be included in the census.

And he that presented his offering the first day was Nahshon the son of Amminadab, of the tribe of Judah;...

... This was the offering of Ahira the son of Enan.

Numbers 7:12 - 83

Each prince of each tribe presented the exact same gifts to the dedication of the altar. The prince is named and the gifts described in detail. The gifts were equal in quantity and size. The individual gifts had symbolical significance, as did the sum total. However, each tribe had their unique mission and the spiritual quality of each gift was distinguished from the others. An example could be when two people each give the same cash contribution, but the reasons leading up to it, and the feelings and spirit about it, are much more intricate and involved. So too here.

As the US is beginning to reopen, we are working on what to do about the High Holidays. This is not an easy answer considering the nature of our congregation, concerns about sterilizing and keeping the building as clean as possible, etc.

The USCJ, the Jewish Federation of the Heart of NJ, local Rabbis and the Presidents of Middlesex County synagogues of all denominations are in touch and are looking at numerous issues surrounding services for the High Holidays. The conversation just began so there isn't anything to report to you as of yet. Rest assured, as we move through this process, I will keep you updated on what we are learning and the direction we are leaning. Towards that end, I would like to ask you some questions and would really like you to send me your answers. I cannot promise anything at this time, but the more information we have, the easier it will be to move forward. Obviously, we don't know what the status of Covid19 will be in the fall so answer as of today.
