

Korach

Numbers 16:1-18:32

Parsha name

Korach: Named for the leader of the rebellion, an unfortunate event and a supposedly wicked person. However, his underlying reasons were noble – He wanted to be the High Priest; to stand before G-d and serve Him; and he felt he would do a better job than Aaron and Moses. He was not corrupt in his ideology, only his method. The parsha's name does him honor for his deep spirituality. The parsha itself only tells us of his faults.

Torah portion summary and selection

This parsha has the last complaining of the journey. G-d finally puts an end to it with the punishment for Korach for his rebellion and Dathan and Abiram for theirs. Aaron is firmly established as G-d's choice for High Priest. The Pidyon Haben ceremony for redeeming the first-born and tithing is described in the parsha.

Now Korah, the son of Izhar, the son of Kohath, the son of Levi...took men;

Numbers 16:1

"Took men" is translated also as "took" and as "separated himself." Whom did he take? And how? He took them to his side with words, making himself out to be a wise person. And if he was so wise, why did he act so foolishly against Moses and Aaron? Korah bore great anger (as well as envy and greed) against Moses because Moses chose Korah's younger brother to be the leader of the Kohathites, and he planned and waited until the time was ripe for rebellion. This time was right after the "decree of death" to everyone over age 20 after the spy incident. Korah also helped the men joining him by getting them drunk so their senses would be dulled. Korah also had a vision that the great judge and prophet Samuel would be descended from him so he thought he would prevail and take over the role and power of the High Priest. "Separate himself" refers to Korah's intention of usurping the power for himself even as he spoke of unity, equality and the lack of need for a "leader".

The following fresco painted in 1480-1482, *The Punishment of Korah and the Stoning of Moses and Aaron* by Sandro Botticcelli is in the Sistine Chapel. A restored depiction of the Arch of Constantine is shown in the center.

Rosh Chodesh Tammuz

Tammuz is the fourth of the 12 months of the Jewish calendar. The month of Tammuz begins the "season" of the summer. The three months of this season are Tammuz, Av and Elul. Rosh Chodesh Tammuz was on Tuesday, June 23, 2020.

Meaning and Rituals in Tammuz

The following ritual was submitted by Nechama Lurie. She belongs to a Well Circle outside of Detroit.



17th of Tammuz

The 17th of Tammuz is an important day for Hebrew calendar geeks. It marks the day the Jerusalem walls were breached by the Romans, kicking off a period of mourning which culminates in the destruction of both Temples in the upcoming month, on the 9th of Av. But back to the 17th of Tammuz. On this day, centuries earlier, while wandering in the desert, Moses smashes the Tablets of the Ten Commandments after descending from Mount Sinai to witness the Israelites worshipping a Golden Calf. This day is a rather destructive day, and Jews the world over commemorate this moment with a fast (observed from dawn on the 17th of Tammuz until the sun goes down on the 18th of Tammuz).

Whether you fast on this day or not, you're invited to pay specific attention to the natural human inclination to lose one's faith and get distracted by anger.

Rosh Chodesh: a Holiday Specially for Jewish Women

Because the Israelite women didn't participate in the sin of building the Golden Calf (in spite of the men's demands that the women donate their gold jewelry to construct the bovine idol, the women refused), the great commentator Rashi declared Rosh Chodesh a holiday specifically for Jewish women.

(Rashi is a mega important, 11th century Jewish thinker and commentator on the Torah. So much of modern Jewish thought comes from him. He should really have a hashtag — #WWRS - What Would Rashi Say?)

For this, the Divine gifted Jewish women Rosh Chodesh, an extra time of rest and study each month. It just so happened this holiday coincided with our traditional menstruating time. (But let's be real; there are no coincidences.)

Where Did We Get the Name Tammuz?

The Hebrew names for the Jewish months originated in Babylon during the 70-year exile (after the destruction of the First Temple in 586 B.C.E.). "Tammuz" was actually the name of a Babylonian idol and deity. Maimonides, aka the Rambam, tells us that Tammuz was a false prophet who, according to ancient Mesopotamian lore, was crowned by the gods and flies away following his tragic death.

How sacrilegious to then attribute one of Hebrew months to an icon that contradicts the very core of Judaism's monotheistic beliefs, right? But actually, not really; Judaism is all about striving towards more light and learning from our mistakes. The Israelites indeed struggled to adhere to the prohibition against idol worship as they wandered. Naming this month after a false idol is a reminder of past mistakes and a commemoration to overcoming them.
