

Pinchas

Numbers 25:10-30:1.

Parsha name

Pinchas: Pinchas redux. The parsha seems to be named for someone that does not have a continuing role throughout the parsha. However, Pinchas is an example or a symbol for the conversion of the Israelites toward lives of virtuousness with this parsha containing many ways to bring this about.

Torah portion summary and selections

Phinehas is reintroduced as the grandson of Aaron. Why? Maybe the people were shocked and disapproved of his impulsive actions in the previous chapter. Another census. The story of the daughters of Zelophehad - a rare Biblical occurrence of women's rights (although many women have very important, active and prominent leadership roles). Moses is told he will die and should designate Joshua as his successor. Laws of inheritance. Daily and festival offerings. We read from this portion on the holidays.

To the more thou shalt give the more inheritance, and to the fewer thou shalt give the less inheritance; to each one according to those that were numbered of it shall its inheritance be given.

Numbers 26:54

Another and final census has been taken. This one is to determine the allocation of land when they enter Eretz Yisrael. This verse has many interpretations. Rashi says that the larger tribes will get larger portions so that each individual would get the same size plot. Ramban says that each tribe would get an equal portion with their members getting an equal share among them. Rabbi Naftali Tzvi Yehudah Berlin (1817 – 1893) ("The Netziv") expands upon this and says that each person would get a share of equal value so that the members of the larger tribes would get a smaller piece but of better value (i.e. more fertile), while the members of the smaller tribes would get bigger pieces of lesser value. Rabbi Zalman Sorotzkin (*Insights in the Torah*) offers his rationale of the Netziv's interpretation saying that there is really no difference in the productivity of two pieces of land. The difference being that the less fertile requires more work which can be better done by the larger tribes because they have more people working. Now, how do we reconcile what we just read about the division of the land with the verse that follows that says the land will be divided by lot? That places the choice in G-d's hands, removing jealously among the tribes over the land division.

This seems like a modern day economics lesson.

But among these there was not a man of them that were numbered by Moses and Aaron the priest, who numbered the children of Israel in the wilderness of Sinai.


Numbers 26:64

The forty-year journey is reaching an end. A last census was taken and except for Caleb and Joshua, none of those that were included in the first census will be entering the Promised Land.

Israel Based on the United Nations Partition Plan

Look at the map below of the land that the United Nations created for the State of Israel. This really happened but it looks like a cruel joke. Israel was divided into three noncontiguous parts (as was the Arab state). However, this was too much for the surrounding Arab nations and they attacked to take over **all** of what the United Nations designated for Israel. After Israel's counterattack, which was not supported by any government including the United States, Israel became an undivided nation.

The Arab state was never created since it was more important for the Arabs that there be no Israel than any new Arab state. This seems to still be the situation. My comment: It is impossible for a Palestinian state to be currently formed since they are divided into two hate filled factions and there is no leadership that could speak or represent the people that call themselves "Palestinians".

Tish b'av in the United States



When Is Tisha B'Av 2020? Quick Facts

This Thu, Jul 30, 2020

year:

Many Jewish Americans observe Tisha B'Av, which is the ninth day of the month of Av in the Jewish calendar. It is a day of mourning to remember various events such as the destruction of the First Temple and Second Temple in Jerusalem. When Tisha B'Av falls on Shabbat (Saturday), it is deferred to Sunday, 10th of Av.



Torah study is forbidden on Tisha B'Av except for sad texts such as the Book of Lamentations.

What Do People Do?

Many Jewish people in the United States observe various restrictions during Tisha B'Av. These restrictions may include:

- Fasting.
- · Avoiding washing, bathing, shaving or wearing cosmetics.
- Not wearing leather shoes.
- Avoiding certain types of work.
- Abstaining from sexual activities.

Many traditional mourning practices are observed, such as refraining from smiling and laughing. Those who observe Tisha B'Av are allowed to study only certain portions of the Torah and Talmud. The book of Lamentations is read and mourning prayers are recited in the synagogue. The ark (cabinet where the Torah is kept) is draped in black.

Some universities or learning centers give those who observe Tisha B'Av the chance to sit exams at other dates, on the proviso that certain requirements are met. Some Jewish centers offer a program for observing Tisha B'Av. People who are sick are exempted from fasting on that day.

Public Life

Tisha B'Av is not a federal public holiday in the United States. However, some Jewish organizations may be closed or have restricted opening hours.

Background

Tisha B'Av, also known as the Jewish Fast of Av, is a period of fasting, lamentation and prayer to remember the destruction of the First and Second Temples of Jerusalem. The Jewish people still continued the fast day even after they rebuilt the First Temple after the Babylonians destroyed it in 586 BCE. The Romans destroyed the Second Temple by burning it in 70 CE and this marked the start of a long exile period for Jewish people. These are two of five sad events or calamities that occurred on the ninth

day of the month of Av. The other three were when:

- Ten of the 12 scouts sent by Moses to Canaan gave negative reports of the area, leading to the Israelites' despair.
- The Romans captured the fortress city of Beitar, the last stronghold of the leaders of the Bar Kochba revolt, and thousands of Jewish people, including Bar Kokhba (or Kochba), were massacred in 135 CE.
- The city of Jerusalem was destroyed in 136 CE.

Tisha B'Av is a sad day that observes other major disasters and tragedies that Jewish people experienced throughout history. These include: The expulsion of the Jewish people from England in 1290 and from Spain in 1492; as well as the mass deportation of Jewish people from the Warsaw Ghetto during World War II.

Tisha B'Av begins at sunset on the previous day and lasts for more than 24 hours. It is the culmination of a three-week period of mourning. Weddings and other parties are generally not permitted, and people refrain from cutting their hair during this period. It is customary to refrain from activities such as eating meat or drinking wine (except on the Shabbat) from the first to the ninth day of AV.
