When done, the Yizkor Book will be sent via e-mail. Only those people who do not have e-mail will be sent the Yizkor Book through U.S. Mail.

The deadline is Friday, September 11, 2020. As always, there will be no exceptions.

A Bissel Yiddish

1. baleboste

A good homemaker, a woman who's in charge of her home and will make sure you remember it.

2. bissel

Or *bisl* – a little bit.

3. **bubbe**

Or *bobe*. It means grandmother, and *bobeshi* is the more affectionate form. *Bubele* is a similarly affectionate word, though it isn't in Yiddish dictionaries.

4. bupkes

Not a word for polite company. *Bubkes* or *bobkes* may be related to the Polish word for "beans", but it really means "goat droppings" or "horse droppings." It's often used by American Jews for "trivial, worthless, useless, a ridiculously small amount" – less than nothing, so to speak. ("After all the work I did, I got bupkes!").

5. chutzpah

Or *khutspe*. Nerve, extreme arrogance, brazen presumption. In English, *chutzpah* often connotes courage or confidence, but among Yiddish speakers, it is not a compliment.

Nitzavim Deuteronomy 29:9-30:20

Parsha name Nitzavim – "standing firm." Prelude to entering Eretz Yisrael the Israelites are united and are standing firmly together. Should be the same today!

Torah portion summary and selections

Choose life, not death, Moses appeals. The sinner will be separated for doom. Righteousness and obedience will be rewarded while defiance would be cruelly punished. The covenant with G-d is for everyone, particularly future generations. Avoid idol worship and do not disregard heavenly curses. If Israel seeks G-d, Israel will find mercy at G-d's hands and will be brought back to the land of our fathers - Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. The choice is ours.

I call heaven and earth to witness against you this day, that I have set before thee life and death, the blessing and the curse; therefore choose life, that thou mayest live, thou and thy seed;

Deuteronomy 30:19

For the last few weeks there has been a constant pleading to follow G-d's ways. On some reckoning it might seem too much, too preachy, but we should try to understand that Moses is about to die and he is making one last plea to us to follow in the right path

Vayyelech Deuteronomy 31:1- 31:30

Parsha name Vayyelech – "And he went" – Moses goes to the people with his final exhortations. He tells the people to "be strong and of good courage" because the L-rd will be with you.

Torah portion summary and selections

Moses is 120 years old and appoints Joshua as his successor. Moses writes the words of the Torah and we are commanded to hear, learn and observe the Torah. The Torah is to be made the rule of life. The people are admonished not to go astray.

And Moses said unto them: "I am a hundred and twenty years old this day..."

Deuteronomy 31:2

Forty years earlier Moses first appeared before G-d saying *He na nee* - here am I (Exodus 3:4). The journey that brought G-d's word to all the peoples is about to end for Moshe.

Haftorah summary and selections

Isaiah 61:10-63:9

The haftorah is the last of the Haftorahs of Consolation. The prophet speaks that he will not relent until we change our ways and move toward G-d. Next week is Rosh Hashanah.

In His love and in His pity He redeemed them; And He bore them, and carried them all the days of old.

Isaiah 63:9

Final words of haftorah and final of the Haftorahs of Consolation.

September 11, 2001's Terrible Events Anniversary

In 2001 I was emailing a weekly One Minute Dvar Torah to about 450 people. I usually prepared and sent it on Tuesday nights, choosing to spend that night studying the Torah. 9/11/2001 was a Tuesday and that night I agonized over the dastardly events of that day, and also wanted to write something meaningful. The parsha was Nitzavim, this week's parsha, and I wanted to take into account the context of that Torah portion. What I wrote appears under this photo.
